CHAIRMAN'S 2019/20 ANNUAL REPORT

Covid-19 has reared an ugly little viral head which means that you will receive this information by email or post.

The speech that I would have given as Chair of CODS, I will write to you here, and hope that you will contact the committee, using the details below, to vote on the various issues and to approve our new committee. We need a minimum of 20 people to respond in order to fulfil the quorum criteria laid down in the constitution and, as these strange times call for strange measures, we would ask that you respond as soon as possible with any comments or any other business which you may have wished to raise at the AGM to cods.secretary@gmail.com, or to Lee Hatcher, Ashleigh, The Hill, Cranbrook Kent. Since the last AGM, CODS has staged *Anna Karenina* and *Fiddler on the Roof*, both of which were extremely successful and well received by audiences and all those involved on and off stage.

Anna Karenina was beautifully staged and acted with a haunting score and was a visual spectacle of the type never before staged by the society. We were all very proud to be involved in Jo Reader's production and look forward to an equally exciting show in Arabian Nights, later in the year.

The wonderful musical *Fiddler* brought us new members and old friends and was hailed as a huge success by all concerned. Marvellous performances and an amazing orchestra meant that, all in all, Heather Barnes could be extremely proud of her production of this well-loved classic.

As well as these major achievements we have managed a tidy-up day at Flishinghurst, a Quiz Night and a Queen's Hall sorting day. These were almost exclusively manned by committee members and their families – it would be lovely to see a few other faces!

CHAIRMAN'S 2019/20 AUM REPORT

2019 ended, and our centenary year began as the curtain came down on the Christmas panto. The rather last-minute change of plan meant we staged *Treasure Island* and we filled the Queen's Hall Theatre with fun and music, generating a good profit and making many people very happy!

I was so pleased to be able to put on this show with a cast consisting of many youngsters and some new and returning members, all of whom gave their all despite various medical and other problems. I would like particularly to mention Phil Mummery who followed up his starring role as 'comedy Christmas Tree' last year, with a walk on role as 'Robin the Robber' this year. I had to persuade Phil not to drop out when he was diagnosed with terminal cancer in November - he obviously did not want to drop out. He was so pleased to be in his last show for CODS and loved every minute. We lost Phil last week, after he had been made the first Mayor of Cranbrook a fortnight before. I made the decision to donate £500 of the panto profit to the Hospice in the Weald in memory of Phil.

We also donated £250 to Penny's pet charity Hypo Hounds, which trains dogs to alert their diabetic owners when they are close to a hypo, and £250 to FUM – Friends of Urambo and Mwanhala – a charity close to my heart having taken a group to Tanzania to do work with them in the past.

Our centenary celebrations kicked off with a great meal at the London Beach which brought together many members of the society, old and new and also generated a good sum of money for the society; even though the committee decided to subsidise the meal to enable more people to come along. It was lovely to see so many CODS' faces there and all seemed to enjoy finding themselves in pictures on our photographic display of a century of CODS shows.

Unfortunately, matters have now conspired against us and all is heading off down the Swanee. Our beautifully laid plans for 2020 have had to be put on hold, whilst we all try to avoid the Coronavirus. We have already had to postpone our *Sing 100* concert, which is such a great shame after all Alison's and John's hard work, but we hope to revive this in September, combining it with a celebratory high tea event in the heart of Cranbrook.

Arabian Nights, which was to be staged at the end of May, will now be pushed back to the Christmas Panto slot and we will leave *Kipps* in the present October half term slot until we have a better idea of what lies ahead. This might have implications on the *Kipps* auditions, but we will let you all know CODS' plans in plenty of time.

Meanwhile, we have a couple of vacancies on the CODS committee and would love to see a new face or two to replace those who are retiring.

Vice Chairman - who would be available to take over as Chairman next year,

Hall Manager – in charge of locking up the theatre after performances. Maurice is retiring after many years on the committee and in his various roles (what will we do without him?) We wish him all the very, very best and thank him for his many unstinting years of devoted service to CODS. If we were at an AGM you would all clap and cheer at this point!

Member in charge of publicity – this would involve social media posts and interaction with newspapers and other media outlets to promote the shows, though not necessarily poster and publicity design, unless the new member wanted to do this.

Please consider whether you might be interested in any of these roles or whether you might just like to ease yourself in by being an ordinary committee member without any particular responsibility.

Life in Am Dram has changed in the past few years. No longer do people remain loyal to one society, but performers have the option to flit between groups and to pick and choose which shows they are interested in, rather than simply auditioning for the show that their local group is staging. With this in mind, the committee has been discussing changes in subscriptions and show fees and Glyn has a suggestion about altering these payments going forward to enable people to be involved in the shows that interest them without the expense of a sizeable subscription. Please read and consider his proposals and let us know your thoughts.

In this world, where strangeness is becoming the norm and where we cannot seem to anticipate the future with any certainty, we need to be adaptable and to move forward in terms of technology as well as catering for those amongst us who struggle to keep up with such things. This is one of the continuing challenges for the committee, who no longer simply choose a show and organise how best to put it on stage. We now have less commitment from a dwindling number of members, and we need to compete with a growing amount of competition both in live theatre, in video games as well as in the hundreds of channels available on the box. In order to thrive for another 100 years, we need to work in a spirit of cooperation and spread the load amongst the wider membership and ask you all to consider whether you might be able to join the committee and give just a few hours each month to help out.

On a more positive note, although we will need to alter all our plans for 2020, we can, at least be happy that we, unlike many societies, have no imminent production on which we have spent many thousands and which cannot be rescheduled.

As Gloria Gaynor so eloquently put it - 'We will survive!'

CODS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

CODS 2020 SURVEY

MEMBERSHIP FEES FOR 2020/21

The following was agreed by members from our remote AGM;

We maintain annual membership at its present levels of £40, £20 and £10 for adults, concessions/junior and child members respectively

We have introduced a 'per show' membership that lasts for the rehearsals and performances of an individual show/play of £20 for adults and £5 for others (this is separate from any 'show fees').

We will no longer offer monthly payments for new members or for the 'per show' option, only those that have paid a full annual membership for at least 1 year.
