



Memories of Geoffrey Grinstead

On moving from Maidenhead in Berkshire in 1984 I was keen to continue my involvement in local theatre so joined CODS for their production of South Pacific, in which Geoffrey was playing the part of Stewpot. As rehearsals progressed his enthusiasm and comedic talent shone through and this was the start of a friendship that lasted for 30 years. As his nephew said at his funeral, CODS was his life. The society meant a great deal to him and he served on the committee helping to build up the finances, directing many successful plays and musicals, as well as working behind the scenes. Ask Geoffrey to take on the advertising for a production and you knew you were in safe hands. After a persuasive chat very few people would say 'no' to any fresh and innovative ideas he had to get good audiences.

He was always happy to turn out on those horrible cold or wet nights for rehearsal and so encouraging to his actors. Probably he was at his best when directing comedies. For me Noises Off showed off his talent brilliantly. His eye for casting this particular production could not have been bettered and friends who joined us as audience members on the final Saturday often say it was the best amateur comedy production they have seen.

Geoffrey had a deep belief in the importance of the family so when, in 1987, the Vicar of St Dunstans asked him if he could put on some entertainment for Christmas, Geoffrey agreed to produce a pantomime with all the proceedings going to the Church Fund. The Vicar was delighted and so enthused by the idea that he was persuaded by Geoffrey to take part in it, which he duly did, as the Baron Hardup!

The show, which was supposed to be a one-off, was such a success raising £3000, that the people of Cranbrook, just like Oliver Twist, asked for more. So, in 1988, Geoffrey persuaded a group of people to form a

committee and The Cranbrook Showtimers, a group dedicated to putting on traditional family pantomime every Christmas, What born. Geoffrey was started went on for 23 years 2010 when The until Showtimers performed their last production, Jack and The Beanstalk. His desire was that any money raised should go to local charities and thanks to his enormous enthusiasm and determination The Showtimers raised over £50,000 during its existence.

Although Geoffrey and Barbara moved from Cranbrook to Broadoak unable and latterly he was some years ago, appreciate the foundation he had built, his legacy lives on and I know he would be so pleased to know that, in 2011, CODS took over and Geoffrey's there wish that should continue be family entertainment in the Queen's Hall at Christmas time. Without him many local charities would have been a lot worse off and many young and aspiring performers would have been robbed of the benefit of his kindness, inspiration and advice. I know Mike and I are richer for the experience of having known and working with him.

There are some people you meet in life that you never forget - for us Geoffrey is one of those.

High Society is wonderful 50's musical comedy, with the superb music of Cole Porter based on the Philadelphia Story. It's the tale of socialite Tracy Samantha Lord, who is preparing for her lavish summer wedding to George Kitteridge — really rather a bore, when her ex millionaire husband C K Dexter Haven turns up and announces that unless she agrees for the wedding to be reported by hacks Mike and Liz, revelations about her Father Seth Lord and a liaison with an exotic dancer will be revealed in a society magazine. Mayhem ensues with bizarre behaviour, with relatives being introduced as others appearing to be a totally dysfunctional family. Dexter reminisces their honeymoon on the yacht the True Love. M & D patch up with the interference of little sister Dinah, George leaves in disgust. Liz and Mike become an item finding true happiness, and Dexter and Tracy find true love.

FRONT OF HOUSE: A busy foyer with tickets waiting for collection, sashed programme and raffle tickets sellers, with refreshments available and the opportunity of chatting to old friends. Regretfully, no winning numbers today. An excellent display of production photographs especially the Spy magazine front covers and the old film edges which were beautifully produced.


PROGRAMME: An A5, very comprehensive sparkling booklet from Lee Hatcher, with a good colour cover containing interesting information, Director's Notes, plenty of sponsorship and good advertising. The NODA crest and wording appeared and I was pleased to see future productions projects as well as past productions listed.

MUSIC: A good ten piece orchestra in the pit, with multi talented Sue Wightman returning from Oxfordshire to conduct the lively complex score, with Ruth Roberts rehearsal pianist as well as juggling cello and keyboard. I struggled to hear the opening chorus of stenographers in the Spy Magazine Office and at times the musical numbers were too loud. Some very well rehearsed numbers with some quality harmony, and of course Cole Porter's melodies are so very well known and memorable.

SCENERY: Nigel Stimson designed and together with members built a first class set and he also acted as SM. Shifting of pieces was well timed, with the minimum of interruption and noise. The stage was used to advantage with the busy Spy Mag Office well furnished with attention to detail on one side, Dexter's Dressing Room on the other both remaining in position. There was the Lord's Drawing Room or the South Parlour, a terrace with arbour

loaned from Bumbles, the swimming pool with spring board into the Orchestra Pit worked well with good changing room, the ballroom with it's pillars and more pillars and then Joey's Diner. Good selection of props throughout including numerous wedding gifts in the drawing room.

COSTUMES: The three wardrobe ladies did a great job producing such excellent outfits - elegant and in keeping throughout, with matching shoes and accessories, hair styling and make-up well finished. I particularly liked the choice of frocks for Tracy who looked stunning in her blue/lime frock, pale yellow evening gown and swimsuit.

SOUND/LIGHTING: I wasn't completely happy with the shrillness of sound I experienced throughout the performance. With a fairly large orchestra as well - possibly the performers needed personal mikes but I feel the audience might have been more comfortable with a more natural projection. David Beeken's lighting plot was good throughout changing from interiors and exteriors, from day into night.

THE PRODUCTION: Annie Chesters had a huge challenge with this musical and a committed cast and production team worked exceedingly hard. As the song said it was delightful - Not a huge cast, but all so very versatile, with Choreographer Lisa putting them through there paces resulted in some slick movement particularly effective during full lively ensemble numbers and forming really interesting shapes. One huge part Tracy Lord was portrayed so very well by Victoria Tinkler and her champagne did wonders for her! Simon Tomlinson was a relaxed Dexter enjoying his rendition of 'I Love You Samatha, with perfect pairing from Jo Levett as Liz and Jez Druce, Mike (the hacks) making up a good quartet in 'Well Did You Ever' and 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire'. Robin Harrison as Uncle Willie gave a polished performance with a first class 'Hey Good Looking'. Natasha Pope danced delightfully through her Friday appearance as Dinah throwing in some lovely comedy moments 'Giving Him the Ooh-a-la' with a lovely Mother portrayed by Val King and Geoff King bounder husband Seth. Supporting characters were well cast, worked hard and provided a good feel entertainment, including Joey's Girls. Nice production idea sailing the 'True Love' into the hands of the MD imagining the pit to be the pool.
